## In Search of a Bishop Coadjutor for the Diocese of West Virginia

This the first in a series of reflections from the Diocesan Bishop Coadjutor Search Committee. The reflections, designed for individual consideration and/or group conversations, will continue through the diocesan survey period.

As we begin the process of calling a faithful and faith-filled Bishop Coadjutor who will become the 8th Bishop of WV, let us focus on the work of spiritual discernment.

Soon, you will be asked to complete a survey designed to help us search for the candidate who might shepherd us through our Christian walk for the years ahead.

The Search Committee is offering weekly reflections for you to use individually or in small groups to prepare for your critical role in the process.

### Listening to God Luke 6:12-16 12

Now during those days he went out to the mountain to pray; and he spent the night in prayer to God.

13 And when day came, he called his disciples and chose twelve of them, whom he also named apostles:

14 Simon, whom he named Peter, and his brother Andrew, and James, and John, and Philip, and Bartholomew,

15 and Matthew, and Thomas, and James son of Alphaeus, and Simon, who was called the Zealot,

16 and Judas son of James, and Judas Iscariot, who became a traitor. (NRSV)

Before Jesus made a major decision, he went to the mountain to spend time with God in prayer. By listening to God, he moved forward calling disciples who seemed to be the least likely persons to carry on the work of evangelizing Jesus' new message.

- How might you prepare yourself to hear the unexpected from God?
- How can you bring the teachable mind of a disciple, open to the work of the Spirit to this work?
- Reflect upon the state of mind you bring to the search process. In particular, what thoughts or opinions might shape your responses?
- Do you hold biases or opinions that might silence the Holy Spirit? Can you approach these as opportunities to go deeper in your reflection, to grow?
- When responding to the survey, do you see yourself as an advocate, a humble servant, or an illuminator for the Diocese? What do you see in yourself that shaped your answer?

#### Wisdom of Reflecting in Community

**Scripture Philippians 2:1-11** If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any sharing in the Spirit, any compassion and sympathy, 2 make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. 3 Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. 4 Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. 5 Let the same mind be in you that was[a] in Christ Jesus, 6 who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, 7 but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, 8 he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death— even death on a cross. 9 Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, 10 so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, 11 and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. (NRSV)

#### Reflection

Discernment in a community engages a group of people to follow the leading of the Holy Spirit. It involves prayer, a humble surrendering of control, reflection on Scripture, and listening carefully to one another as together we seek to hear God's voice.

Very soon, the people of the diocese will be asked to participate in a survey to determine the gifts and talents we desire in our next bishop. It seems a bit odd to think about community discernment while many struggle with profound isolation due to the pandemic. However, community discernment creates space for the Holy Spirit to guide, to hold accountable, to bring "a joyous convergence of direction that brings a sense of peace and rightness.

When the deepest desires of persons are aligned with God's deepest desires, life is marked by loving more freely, becoming dedicated to the larger goodness, and experiencing healing and reconciliation with God, oneself, and one another."
